Lake levels are low here on Otisco Lake. But the mood is very high!

With the lack of rain, the and the native weeds emerged as an issue. We are looking at strategies for **both** native and invasive species control. Our board member, **John Bristol** is looking at both mechanical removal of weed and weed bogs as well as a chemical interface. He has had good meetings with the **DEC & OCWA** regarding this along with a contractor for weed control application.

Our steward program continues to be supported by **Finger Lakes Institute.** This year we have primarily focused on the state boat launch as this launch services most of the out-of-state people. We do have coverage at the other two marinas at limited level. The adjustment was based on volume from previous years.

We had a very successful **Annual Meeting** on July 7th. **Don Leopold** from ESF spoke on native plantings, **Sam Elliot** spoke on lawned Meadow program that they have been doing all that they have been studying over at ESF. **Lauren Darcy** gave an update on the Otisco Lake Watershed Protection Plan and **Andy Zepp** from **Finger Lakes Land Trust** gave an overview of the newly acquired **Henderson property** renamed and rechristened at a ribbon cutting ceremony this month the **Otisco Shores Conservation Park**. We are already looking at programs and coordination with ESF to evaluate and manage and maintain the property.

We have an active group working on our **9-element plan**. Board member **Marion Greenhalgh** has taken this on as a primary project. She is working with county planners and former legislator **Mike Plochocki** to obtain a grant for funds to continue to evaluate the lake and watershed for the plan.

The **Otisco Lake Drinking Water Source Protection Plan**, has been prepared and final copies being generated. Lauren Darcy of this group spoke at our annual meeting as mentioned above.
